As a student pursuing the Pathway Integrating Child Development and Education Specialist (PICES) Pathway, you will be completing a blended Elementary Education & Child Development Major and coursework/requirements to be recommended for a preliminary Education Specialist Teaching Credential. Below, you will find the required courses needed to complete the major and credential coursework associated with this program and the terms they are offered.

The Elementary Education & Child Development Major has coursework in three areas: liberal foundations, education, and child development. Some of these requirements may also meet requirements set forth by the liberal education program. Liberal Education Program Requirements can be found in the Course Catalogue located on the Registrar Office's website (whittier.edu/registrar).

Liberal Foundations Requirements (13 credits)

For candidates interested in teaching at the elementary school level, additional recommendations are as follows. *Please* note that these are not requirements.

- Recommended for students to take a language (or linguistics) course to satisfy the "Language and Culture" lib ed (breadth) requirement.
- Recommended for students to take a visual or performing art course to satisfy the "Creative Expression" lib ed (breadth) requirement.

- CPR Certification (Adult, Child & Infant)
- · A valid Certificate of Clearance or Substitute Permit

The PICES Program is an undergraduate program. Undergraduate students take sections of courses at the 300 and 400 level. Courses taken at the undergraduate level (i.e. 300 or 400 level) do not count towards a Master of Arts in Teaching.

To be recommended for a preliminary credential, all credential requirements, including coursework, must be completed. All credential coursework must be completed with a B- or better. To matriculate through the credential program, cumulative GPA must be 3.0.
